AU-PAIR PROGRAM

Au Pair in Germany is one of the best routes for young career to get into German, Austria and Netherlands via.

(Here we explain what an AU-PAIR is and how to become an AU-PAIR in German or Austria and Netherlands as a foreigner.)

An "au pair" is basically a 'caretaker' (male or female) who lives permanently with a family in Germany and looks after children there. Au pairs are usually young adults up to approximately 16 to 25 years who receive free board and lodging as well as pocket money during their time with the host family.

Not only do they have a host family taking care of their accommodation, meals and daily expenses, but Au Pairs allows you to get paid pocket money of around \$400 a month!!

Work as au pair in Germany:

In Germany, the work as au pair has got an official recognition and the young adults from abroad have a strong protection during their stay in Germany. Au pairs receive a contract before the start of their work, which regulates their tasks, rights and duties.

In addition, au pairs for Germany receive special Visas through the German Embassies and Consulates. At Berliner Platz and other quality providers in our partnership, Au-Pairs always have a contact person who can help and intervene in the event of any problems

Tasks during work as au pair in Germany.

The main task for the au pair is to look after the children. In most cases, these children are no longer babies, but infants of pre-school age. A typical task of the au pair is, for example, to supervise the play of the child on the playground or in the children's room or to take the child to the kindergarten and pick it up. The families also often expect the child to do light housework, such as clearing the dining table, shopping, cleaning up the children's room or vacuuming the apartment. However, an au-pair is not primarily a cleaner of the host family, but is particularly helpful in childcare.

As an Au-Pair you can, for example, start after your school attendance (if you are already 18 years old), after your studies or during a break of your studies.

CHECKLIST

YOU are at least 18 years old, but younger than 27 years.

you have basic knowledge of the German language (level A1) or studying towards it.

! If you do not come from the EU, your language skills will usually be checked at the embassy / consulate in a conversation about everyday topics before you get a visa for Germany.

While a longer period than 12 months is not planned, your assignment may be shorter than 6 months.

In addition, it is possible to change to another family if a family and an au pair do not get along - this can happen and can always be solved!

THE VOLUNTARY/SOCIAL YEAR IN GERMANY - (FSJ)

'The Voluntary Social Year (FSJ) is a social voluntary service in Germany. Typical workplaces are helpers in social organizations like hospitals, NGOs, or cultural associations.

Foreigners who have already completed their school education but BELOW 27 years old can apply. The Voluntary Social Year is open to applicants from any country in the world.!!

A prerequisite for foreign applicants is that they already have a knowledge of German, if possible at level B1. Applicants who are not from the European Union must also note that a visa is required.

How do I get a visa for a Voluntary year in Germany?

For a Voluntary Social Year, all persons who are not German or come from another member state of the European Union require a visa. The visa must be applied for before entering Germany and a contract with an employer in Germany must already exist when applying for the visa.

Applicants from abroad should therefore note that the very first step is to find an employer. The application for a visa will then often take several weeks. So if you are interested in a voluntary social year in Germany and are a third-country national, you should start your application several months before the desired activity begins.

What can I do after the Voluntary year in? Germany?

In case you use the FSJ to improve your language skills and personal skills it might be a good idea to start an apprenticeship after the FSJ. This would mean to become a skilled worker in the area of your preferred profession in Germany. An apprenticeship, also called 'vocational training' is a structured training process in which you learn both theoretical knowledge at vocational school and practical knowledge in the companies. An FSJ usually does not offer such structured training.

REQUIREMENTS FOR INTERNATIONAL APPLICANTS FOR A VOLUNTARY YEAR IN GERMANY

The most important prerequisite for an FSJ as a foreigner in Germany is first of all to find an employer who offers such an FSJ.

At BerlinerPlatz, we are connected to such Agents and Cooperates with organizations and companies that offer an FSJ in Germany also for foreigners.

Most employers also expect international applicants to speak German at least at level A2 so that they can take over the various tasks in the social or cultural area in Germany.

APPRENTICESHIPS IN GERMANY

Applicants from all countries worldwide can apply for apprenticeships (in German: 'Berufsausbildung', 'Ausbildung').

Apprentices in Germany receive a monthly payment and ***have high chances for a permanent work in Germany.***

NB: German language skills are mandatory.

***What does Ausbildung in Germany mean?**

'Ausbildung' is the German term for apprenticeship, a form of a vocational training program.

With a Germany Apprenticeship, you get ***a state-controlled degree*** as a skilled worker, providing huge perspectives for living and working in Germany even if you are a citizen of a non-EU-country.

***What is Ausbildung in Germany*?**

Apprenticeships (also called "vocational training") is a formal educational qualification in the area *of blue collar professions* like sales person, painter, carpenter, nurse, butcher, or car mechanic. After a 3-year training in Germany a degree of a skilled worker is issued. This provides good chances for foreigners from all over the world to get a permanent work position in Germany.

*The system of vocational training in Germany is unique: *

•Within a paid multi-year education program, students learn a profession according to German standards in vocational schools as well as the companies which employ the trainees.

What are the qualifications required for an Ausbildung in Germany?

Foreigners from *all countries* are eligible to apply for an Ausbildung (apprenticeship) in Germany. German language requirements are at B1.

Any foreigner, regardless of their age, speaking German on level B1 at least, and *having finished 9 to 10 years of education*(That is up to O Level) with any 5 Subject passes.

YES, ANY 5 O' LEVEL SUBJECTS!!!

How much do I earn in an apprenticeship program in Germany?

During your training you will receive a monthly payment from your employer to cover your basic living costs in Germany.

The monthly remuneration ranges from at least €900/\$1000 and it increases as you go up wards to the third training year.

For some apprenticeship positions German employers pay even more than €1,200/\$1354 per month. The amount of the monthly allowance depends to a large extent on your employer and your curriculum vitae.

Employers often offer additional support such as free transport tickets or financial support for your meals etc.

We or your employer will inform you about the specific conditions during the application process since they are individual for each single position.



The best part of it!

After the apprenticeship you are eligible to be *employed as a skilled worker in Germany to similar conditions as German workers. *!!

With a vocational training in Germany, foreign applicants receive a German qualification as a skilled worker.

'There is a high demand for skilled workers in Germany which almost probably will prevail for many upcoming years. Job chances are tremendously high - most important in the company that was your host during your apprenticeship.

Having successfully finished an apprenticeship, skilled workers •can continue to work in the German company, •or obtain further qualifications (e.g. master craftsman, Bachelor professional or Master professional •or even can start a study at university), •or become self-employed •or return to their home country to work there with the foreign qualification.

Amazing fact!

*With this foreign qualification and existing support of the German government foreigners can set up companies in their home countries with massive advantages. *

In most countries of the world, there is no comparable qualification to the German vocational training system. The PTU offered in Russia, Ukraine or Belarus, for example, has neither the corresponding contents nor the length and quality of the German training.

It is very critical to understand that the students in the vocational training are employees of a company where they work approximately 50% of their time in order to learn.

During the other 50% they receive a training in a vocational school.

Amazing fact

The company pays all schooling fees for the apprentices.

V Hence candidates must be employed by a company - only then they can start the training.

This is why international candidates need our assistance to apply.

FACTS TO CONSIDER ABOUT GERMAN APPRENTICESHIP



No tuition fees for all apprenticeship programs. You study for free!!



You get paid minimum €900 /month and it keeps going up during your 3 years of studying.



No upper age limit for all programs!! Anyone above 18 is eligible. Also males and females alike are eligible.



A school leaving certificate with at least 9 years of studying is the basic academic requirement (i.e. basic 5 passes at Form 4 / O Level, /A Level/ Matric.) Most programs don't specify subjects: *just 'some passes' are ok! *

A few programs in IT and Tech would require Mathematics or Science or basic computer skills. Most other programs don't specify anything!



Other qualifications/experience you already have are an added advantage, especially on negotiating monthly allowance.



Your accommodation and most living costs are covered.



Your job prospects are almost automatic- remembering while you are studying you are already employed and after graduating, you are a golden egg up for grabs due to the shortage of skilled labor force prevalent in Germany. It's your choice to continue with the same employer or look around...you got options!!



You graduate with a degree equivalent!!



Salaries are usually above €2000 per month.



You are then eligible for all the benefits skilled immigrant visa, and can apply for residence and subsequently Permanent residence permit after staying and working in Germany the required period of time. (now 4 years: under the New Skilled Immigrant Act of 2020)

BFD IN GERMANY FOR FOREIGNERS

The BF-D in Germany for foreigners is a possibility of professional activity in Germany even for persons from non-EU countries. In the BFD, a Federal Volunteer Service, foreign applicants can get involved in Germany in the areas of social welfare, ecology, culture, sports, integration, civil defense etc.

Basic facts about BF-D in Germany for foreigners.

Which are the advantages of the BF-D in Germany for foreigners?

The advantage of the BF-D is that applicants from non-EU countries and with little knowledge of the German language can also take up an activity in Germany through this. While doing this voluntary service in Germany for several months, they can improve their German language skills so that they might later take up a vocational training, studies or a job in Germany.

What is the BF-D in Germany for foreigners? The BF-D (Federal Volunteer Service) is a voluntary service of German or foreign women and men. People of any age can apply. The Federal Volunteer Service is about people getting involved for the common good in Germany. For this reason, BF-D positions are offered in the areas of social services (health), ecology and nature conservation, culture and science, or in the areas of sports, integration and coexistence, or civil defense and disaster control. Employing entities can be German associations and organizations, the public sector and non-profit companies.

***How do I get a visa for BF-D in Germany for foreigners? ***

First of all, you need a BF-D place. You do not have to worry about a visa until you have a commitment for your BF-D from us *Limitless Solutions Global*.

We will then inform and assist you to apply for your visa at the German embassy and consulate in your home country.

***How well do I have to speak German for This depends on the provider and whether you need a visa? ***

As a rule, German language skills A2/B1 are sufficient.

Is there an age limit for BF-D in Germany for foreigners?

There is no age limit for BF-D in Germany for foreigners. However, a BF-D can usually only be started at the age of 18, so that you can move around in Germany without the consent of your parents.

***How much do I earn in the BF-D in Germany for foreigners? ***

There is no salary in the BF-D. However, participants receive pocket money of a maximum of * 600 Euros *.

Each provider of a BF-D decides for itself whether and in what amount pocket money is paid. In addition, accommodation and meals can be provided free of charge or the costs can be reimbursed.

Here too, however, each assignment location decides for itself whether this can be offered to the participants.

Contributions for pension, accident, health, nursing care and unemployment insurance are also paid by the assignment location.

*How long does a BFD take

The minimum is 6 months. The usual standard time is 12 months and the maximum is 18 months. A BF-D can be repeated as often as you like.

*What can the BF-D help me with? *

If you are a foreigner, the BF-D can help you to learn German better and to gain practical experience in Germany. For example, before you start an apprenticeship or study in Germany.
